What are Professional Learning Communities (PLC)?

A professional learning community (PLC) in schools involves collaboration, sharing and ongoing critical interrogation of teaching practices in line with professional standards. PLCs are learning-oriented and promote the growth of teachers and students.

WHY PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITIES?

- PLCs are more effective than individual champions in ensuring that school-wide pedagogical changes are sustainable
- PLCs help develop teachers' confidence and self-efficacy
- Students achieve at higher levels in schools with positive PLCs
- PLCs build effective encourage and leadership and management
- When teachers across a school implement the same learnings and strategies, they create a consistent learning experience for students

PLCs are an action in our 2022-2024 Site Improvement Plan. Currently our teaching staff are deeply engaged in their PLC around the text 'The Writing Revolution'. PLCs are in year level teams (JP, MP and UP), with each member of the leadership team also belonging to a PLC team.

NAPLAN Coordinated Practice Test

NAPLAN online tests are fast approaching. Year 3 students this week participated in the NAPLAN Coordinated Practice Test. The CPT is set nationally and occurred on the same date and time across the country. The purpose of CPT is to help students feel more comfortable and familiar with the online testing environment. Student performance in the practice tests will not be assessed. The practice test was also an opportunity to test our IT infrastructure for the official online NAPLAN tests for Year 3 and 5 students, which will occur in Week 7 and 8, 15/3 -24/3.

NAPLAN Online tests provide a snapshot of where students are at with their learning and assist us to set priorities for our Site Improvement Planning. Occasionally, parents have reasons for not wanting their child to sit the tests and this can occur after consultation with the Principal or by providing information to the school in writing. The tests conducted are Numeracy, Reading, Writing and Language Conventions. If you would like further information, please contact your child's teacher, or me.

The gates open just prior to this. Students can go straight to their class and wait for the bell, when the classrooms will be opened by the teacher.


Road Safety around the school


I have also volunteered in the wider Kapunda community, through various roles at the local netball and football clubs, the Kindergarten and organizing children's programs at my local church.
